## By-laws Change Proposed by CEDPA Board

## Connecting to the Internet, Part 2

This has been an interesting year. Districts are connecting to the Internet and surfing Cyberspace. Some of us are experimenting with our own "Gopher Holes" or Gopher Servers, World Wide Web Servers, Newsgroup readers, POPmail servers, and the like. However, one thread runs through the entire Internet connectivity issue: Training. While we as technologists can take responsibility for making the technical connection to the Internet, who is responsible for training? If we're hooking up schools and classrooms to the Internet, how will teachers and students deal with this new learning resource? What about access control and security issues?

Several districts are in the process of adopting policies regarding the use of computing equipment in general and the Internet in particular. As soon as these policies are officially adopted and available for publication, they will be summarized in *The DataBus* and placed in entirety on the Newport-Mesa Gopher Server, which can be accessed at gopher.nmusd.k12.ca.us or 198.188.8.6. If you use Mosaic or another World Wide Web client, you can connect to the NMNet Web Server, also at 198.188.8.6 (www.nmusd.k12.ca.us). The gopher server can be accessed directly from the NMNet Home Page.

Connectivity to the Internet is becoming easier. Look for turnkey solutions from Apple and other vendors that make creation of your own Internet domain much easier. Some solutions include the "functionality" of Unix (domain name service and mail handling) without requiring a Unix computer.

Our journey through Cyberspace and the Information Highway will continue in forthcoming issues. Happy surfing!

### **Diverse Speaker Program Greets Attendees**

**Program:** Wide variety of topics provides "something for everyone."

The 1994 Conference Speaker Program has really come together in the last several months. The themes of the conference of integrating technology with education and internetworking are very well represented.

Our kickoff is **George Luginbill** who will present his views on making technology available to education. We are all wrestling with the problem of converting our hard won expertise with administrative computing into a package that the educators in our districts can use. Educators are discovering the need for the technology in the classroom, but generally do not have the skills for district-wide deployment. George has been working with districts and county offices to solve this problem and make a marriage between the two areas work.

We are trying a new format by including a terrific luncheon speaker on Wednesday. We don't want to give you a chance to slow down! **Dr. Philip Bossert's** credentials show him to be the perfect speaker to address the implementation of large scale networks. He put Hawaii on the digital map and will be sharing the good, the bad, and the ugly of these large scale projects. My district is working through these problems right now and I am really excited about hearing Dr. Bossert's insights.

For lunch on Thursday we have a treat with **Edward Dry** speaking on the current state of client/server technology. We have been hearing about the advantages of this technology for some time, but for those of us who have dabbled in it, we know that there are some major hurdles to be jumped. Ed will share some of his experiences and those of some of his customers. This talk should be very informative as well as entertaining.

Friday morning kicks off the last day of the conference with **Mark Kasperowicz** discussing something we deal with every day–getting to the heart of our customers needs and delivering on them. As downsizing (or rightsizing) continues to change our industry, we must continually reevaluate ourselves in these terms. Mark has run some large Information Systems shops and has lots of good ideas for us.

The breakouts this year are heavily focused on internetworking and the Internet. By the end of two and a half days, you should have a working knowledge of what is available on the Internet, how to use it, and how to build

the bridge in your organization to access it. To bring the point home, an Internet lab will be available during the entire conference so you can actually see the physical boxes that can make the connection happen, and you can sit down and "surf" the net.

Finally, we will close with a panel discussion on Friday with a number of Internet and internetworking experts to answer any questions that you still have. This panel, moderated by **Brian Lloyd and Mike Loring**, will be a rare opportunity to talk to so many experts in the same room at the same time—that is if your head doesn't explode with all this new information.

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# Sisnet SIG Meeting Summary

The latest Sisnet meeting was held at the San Diego County Office of Education on September 23, 1994. I want to express a special thank you to Harry Bloom for all his help and for shuttling us to and from the airport. I also want to thank Skip Sharp for getting us a room which helped us keep the costs of the meeting to a minimum.

While attendance at the meeting was light, it allowed us to be very informal. The meeting started off with Russ Brawn from Far West Laboratory giving us a summary and status report on the CSIS project and AIRS. Since it was an informal setting we were able to jump in with questions whenever we wanted. I believe everyone in attendance had a much better understanding of CSIS and what AIRS is all about after Russ' presentation.

The remainder of the meeting was spent discussing how districts or counties buy equipment and software. The question was raised about leasing versus buying. Apparently there are companies that will lease hardware and software to a school or district instead of selling it to them. This would allow the school to always upgrade to the latest hardware and software for a fixed annual cost. This raises some interesting questions about funding for purchases—either one-time funding or on-going funding. The group was interested to learn more about this topic.

Another issue discussed was the use of Ethnic Codes. The question was raised about how schools or districts handle the situation of having a student that does not necessarily fit into one of the defined ethnic codes. After much discussion, it was the consensus that the codes do not always fit and this often puts schools in a difficult position.

The remaining topics covered included the Internet, Training, and Site License Purchases for Software. San Diego COE is currently providing training on the use of the Internet and has trained over 500 teachers since early this year. Additionally, San Diego COE is working on a Site License Purchase for software from Microsoft and Claris. The pricing for this type of site license is extremely competitive and should be looked into by any large district or county. I will attempt to find out more specifics on this issue for future articles.

All in all it was a very rewarding meeting.
